Restorative Justice A Different set of Questions

Criminal Justice	Restorative Justice
What laws have been broken? Who did it? What do they deserve?	Who has been hurt? What are their needs? Whose obligations are these?
Central focus: Offenders have wronged and it is the State's role to impose punishment.	Central focus: Determining victims' needs and offenders' responsibility to repair the harm. This process relies on community support to make possible.

RJP Maine's Vision & Legacy

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ELIGIBLE	Misdemeanors, Burglaries, & Neighbor disputes	EXAMPLES: Criminal Mischief Assault Theft/shoplifting
ELIGIBLE: ON A CASE BY CASE BASIS	Felonies, Civil Offenses, DUI, & Harassment/Terrorizing	EXAMPLES: Arson Furnishing of Scheduled Drugs Vehicular manslaughter
NOT ACCEPTING Keeping a log of requests for future	Violent Offenses & Sex Offenses	EXAMPLES: Domestic Violence Gross Sexual Assault Elevated Aggravated Assault

Referral Screening Criteria

- Person who caused harm ("offender") must be willing to take responsibility for the harm in restorative setting
- 1. Person who caused harm must agree to participate in the process, both in the restorative process and following through on the reparative measures outlined in the Repair Agreement.
- Not required, but generally desirable: person who was harmed ("victim") is interested in participating.





Restorative Justice Project - Maine

Serving Waldo, Knox, Lincoln, & Sagadahoc Counties

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For fiscal year '20/'21...

- 112 Circles
- 53 youth served
- 32 adults referred
- 32 harm repair volunteers
- 90% of people who have been harmed indicated that the restorative justice process met their needs

Our key assumptions . . .

- All human beings have the capacity to learn, grow and change
- All families have strengths
- We don't know anyone's upper limits
- All of our participants are creative, human beings doing the best they can at the moment


